The Center for Women's Studies will begin its third year next Fall! Since its inception, some of the most creative and exciting work of the Center has involved student volunteers and Student Assistants. I want to take this time especially to thank the following Seniors who have demonstrated their deep commitment to Colgate's Women's Studies through their participation in the Center.

Jennifer Fuld (SoAn) has been an important activist since the Center's opening. Last semester, she initiated and coordinated a full week of education and fundraising activities relating to AIDS education. The events culminated in the Center's contributing over \$1,000 to AIDS support organizations in Central New York.

Jessica Schlather (Economics) is the Coordinator of the Spring '93 Leadership Conference. She is responsible for all aspects of the Conference which will involve more than 90 Colgate students recommended as leaders in our community.

Last October, Laura Glasser (PoSci) ran a voter registration drive which succeeded in registering over 300 students to vote in the Presidential election. Laura has also provided on-going monitoring of important Congressional legislation concerning women. She makes this information available to the entire Colgate community through "Legislative Updates."

Alison Seltzberg (PoSci) headed up the Center's Planning Committee for the celebration of International Women's Day held on March 9th at the Cultural Center. This event honored contributions of women to the cause of social justice everywhere.

Perceiving a need for a Women's Alternative Film Series, Amy Hayes (History) initiated this project in the Spring. "Identifiable Qualities: An Interview with Toni Morrison" and "Eating," a film which examines eating disorders, and other innovative cinema have been shown on Thursday afternoons at 4:00 pm at the Center.

Julia Beck (English) coordinated the Center's contribution to Global Awareness Day last semester. As part of this effort, she created an informative pamphlet outlining the Center's resources on women throughout the world.

Our deepest thanks to all of these Seniors. Working with other Assistants and volunteers, they have made the Center a unique part of the Colgate community.

exciting to watch the Women's Studies Program grow. We have lots more courses now, a major and minor concentration, and the Center for Women's Studies has become a focus for the whole campus. It's more work for me but it's worth it!"

According to Mary, the best part of her job is the people she works with and the relationships she develops with them. "The Interdisciplinary Programs are great," she says, "because I have gotten to meet a really wide variety of people from all over Colgate. Also, when Women's Studies brings in outside speakers, it is fun for me to have a chance to meet and talk with them."

But it is the students whom she enjoys the most, and she continues to correspond with many alumni. "I guess every department thinks it has the best students at Colgate," Mary says, "but in Women's Studies I really share so much with the students. Many of them are interested in my life and talk to me about it. Also, lots of them plan to work in human services helping others, and that is something I think is important."

Mary Keys not only thinks helping others is important, she acts on her beliefs. Through the Randallsville Baptist Church, she and her husband, Rich, have started a Music Ministry. This group visits nursing homes and adult residences to entertain the people living there. Mary and Rich also spend time calling on shut-ins and other needy people in the Hamilton area. During the holidays and on other special occasions, they help deliver food and gifts to them. They also actively support other church-sponsored projects, including programs for battered women, pregnant women, the homeless, and the poor.

Mary Keys is a very special person, whose active contributions to her community, to Colgate, and to the Women's Studies Program are irreplaceable. But she refuses to accept compliments about her work, simply stating "In my job and in my life I've always wanted to be helpful, even if that means just being there to give someone a smile when they need it."

Student Research

The Center for Women's Studies sponsors Student Research Presentations at the end of each semester. Our commitment to bringing women's issues into all academic fields of study is demonstrated by the variety of topics covered in this forum. Last semester, three students,

nominated by their professors, gave presentations on work they are doing in women's or gender issues. Jen Koskinen spoke on the topic "Is There a Woman's Approach to Architecture?", Ana Validzic discussed her psychological research with Professor Keating on "Effects of Gender Physiogamy on Perceived Characteristics," and Janet Lopez presented her paper on "Dowry Deaths."

On April 16th, we again plan to offer Student Research Presentations. Erin Leo will provide insight on "Women's Participation in the Labor Force" from research done for her senior thesis and Kate Sweezy will discuss her analysis of divorce statistics. We invite you to join us at 4:00 pm at the Center for Women's Studies to listen to and ask questions of the work done by these women.

Elizabeth Cady Stanton Award for Student Activism

This award is given by the Women's Studies Program to the senior whose career at Colgate is most characterized by activism on issues of concern to women.

Students and faculty are encouraged to nominate students they feel demonstrate a commitment to women's issues through extracurricular activities, work experience, and academic interests. Self-nominations will be accepted.

representatives know how they feel about important issues.

- The NIH Revitalization Act was approved by Congress, allocating money for research on women's health, the codifying of NIH policy on gender equity in research trials, and permanently authorizing the Office of Research on Women's Health.
- More than 40 letters were sent to President Clinton and Food and Drug Administration Commissioner, Dr. David Kessler, expressing opinions on the importation of RU486 following Legislation for Equality Lecture II, "The Politics of RU486."
- Over 50 signatures were collected for the Petition to the UN World Conference on Human Rights proclaiming "Violence Against Women Violates Human Rights."
