This year has been one of growth and expansion for Colgate's Women's Studies Program. As we continue to add exciting courses in Women's Studies, we are especially pleased to announce two new offerings for Fall, 1994. (For a complete list of Women's Studies courses for Fall, 1994 see page 3).

First, with the Department of Philosophy and Religion, we will be cross-listing "Women's Lives and the Religious Traditions." This new course will examine the ways in which women's lives have shaped and been shaped by a variety of religious traditions.

Second, Professor Byrnes of the Political Science Department will teach a new course focused on the politics of abortion. "Law and Politics of Abortion in the United States" will address questions of legal, religious, and political influences on the abortion debate. Our expanding list of courses is important both for our concentrators and for students who take Women's Studies courses during their Colgate career.

The Center for Women's Studies also has been growing, with a record number of programs and activities this year. Much of its success is due to the hard work of our Student Assistants. Women's Studies In Albany!

"Legislative Day", a trip to the New York State Capital in Albany, is sponsored each year by the Center for Women's Studies. On March 29th approximately 50 Colgate students and faculty members are spending the day with legislators and lobbyists in order to be updated on state legislation designed to promote women's rights. Women's reproductive rights, New York State Rape Law, and issues of homeless women and families are addressed in three one hour sessions

Students and faculty have the opportunity to engage and question information presented to them by members of the New York State Assembly and representatives from Family Planning Advocates of New York State, the NYS Coalition for the Homeless, and the NYS Coalition Against Sexual Violence. As senior Tobi Soeldner-Prim states, this trip "helps localize the issue. Students realize these issues are not only discussed on a national level, but are an important part of the political dialogue at a state and local level."

During Session I on women's reproductive rights, Assembly member Deborah Glick, once an active member

in New York City NOW and the Coordinator for the NOW Reproductive Rights Committee and lobbyist Carol Reichert of Family Planning Advocates are discussing reproductive legislation.

Session II concentrates on the New York State Rape Law. The first speaker, Senator John De Francisco, has recently proposed new legislation supporting a change in the definition of female as it appears in rape law statutes. The second speaker, Tonia St. Germain is a public policy researcher with NYS Coalition Against Sexual Violence.

In the last session, Assembly member Barbara Clark who spoke to Colgate students and faculty last year, addresses legislative issues that serve as obstacles to the homeless community. She is followed by Shelly Nortz of the NYS Coalition for the Homeless.
