Each year, it is the cooperative effort of many people - faculty, staff, volunteers, and student assistants - that makes Colgate's Women's Studies Program vibrant.

Women's Studies faculty continue to create new and exciting courses. Our varied offerings for Fall '96 (listed on p. 1 and 3) represent the largest number of our courses offered in one semester. There will also be two First Year Seminars focused on Women's Studies taught by Jill Tiefenthaler and Anne Pitcher.

The Women's Studies Program over the years has benefitted from many student projects organized out of the Center for Women's Studies, which have educated the Colgate community about gender issues. We are especially lucky this year to have a strong group of Seniors involved at the Center, and I want publically to recognize them for their creative work, leadership, and commitment.

For all four of her years at Colgate, Cory Frederick has been active at the Center. Last year, she organized a very successful project with local high school girls from five area schools. This year, Cory and other Colgate students are running bi-weekly discussion groups at a local high school, talking with students about their aspirations, relationships, and self-image.

In the Fall, Jill Glazer did great job making the Center for Women's Studies library more user-friendly. This Spring, Jill continues to write important columns on gender issues for the *Maroon News*, she also is organizing programs in which Colgate students, from a variety of different courses, present and discuss their gender-related research projects. WELFARE AWARENESS WEEK

Panelists will discuss different aspects of welfare and welfare reform. Emphasis will be on solutions for combating the problem of poverty in the United States.
