External Grant and Fellowship Opportunities Deadlines September - December, 2019 and Rolling Deadlines

American Academy in Rome

Rome Prize fellowships offer 11-month residencies with a \$28,000 stipend and half-term residencies with \$16,000 for U.S. artists and scholars in the early or middle stages of their careers in fields including music composition, literature, architecture, visual arts, ancient studies, medieval studies, Renaissance and early modern studies, and modern Italian studies.

Deadline: November 1, 2019

American Association of University Women

Postdoctoral Research Leave Fellowships for women in all fields, pre-tenure; \$30,000. **Deadline:** November 1, 2019 anticipated

Short-Term Research Publication Grants for women in all fields, pre-tenure; \$6,000 for 8 consecutive weeks of final manuscript preparation. **Deadline:** November 1, 2019 anticipated

American Council of Learned Societies

<u>Fellowships</u> in the humanities and related social sciences for 6-12 consecutive months. Maximum award \$40,000 for assistant, \$50,000 for associate, and \$75,000 for full professors.

Deadline: September 25, 2019

American Councils for International Education

<u>Title VIII Research Fellowships</u> provide a stipend and expenses totaling \$7,000-\$25,000 for 3-9 consecutive months of research relevant to U.S. policy in Caucasus, Central Asia, Eastern Europe, Russia, or Southeast Europe. **Deadline:** October 1, 2019

American Philosophical Society

<u>Franklin Research Grants</u> up to \$6,000 for costs of travel to libraries and archives for research leading to publication in all fields, with particular interest in junior scholars who

have recently received the doctorate. **Deadlines:** October 1 and December 2, 2019

Chiang Ching-kuo Foundation

<u>Research Grants</u> for summer salary, research assistants, living costs, and travel, and <u>Scholar Grants</u> from \$20,000-\$35,000 for research and writing on Chinese studies in the humanities and social sciences. **Deadline:** October 15, 2019

Central New York Humanities Corridor

Support for <u>scholarly working groups</u> of faculty from at least two Corridor institutions – Syracuse University, Cornell University, the University of Rochester, schools of the New York Six Consortium (Colgate, Hamilton, Hobart & William Smith, St. Lawrence, Skidmore, Union), and Le Moyne College. \$1,500 - \$2,500 for new and continued working groups, plus multi-year and signature event categories. **Deadline:** October 15, 2019 anticipated

Dumbarton Oaks

<u>Residential fellowships</u> in the areas of Byzantine and Pre-Columbian scholarship for an academic year, semester, or summer, plus <u>one-month non-residential awards</u> of \$3,000 for use of research facilities. Project grants primarily support archaeological research, as well as materials analysis and photographic surveys of objects and monuments. Summer schools and workshops bring together students for in-depth study of languages, material culture, and theory.

Deadline for fellowships: November 1, 2019; non-residential awards: October 1, 2019

Global Religion Research Institute

<u>Research and writing grants</u> for the social scientific study of religions around the world. Categories include International Collaboration, up to \$25,000, and Project Launch, up to \$12,000.

Deadline: mid-October TBA

George A. and Eliza Gardner Howard Foundation

<u>Fellowships</u> of \$35,000 for artists, scholars, and writers in "early midcareer" who have achieved recognition for at least one major project. Fields for award year 2020-2021 are fiction, poetry, playwriting, and theatre studies.

Deadline: November 1, 2019

Humanities New York

<u>Grants for humanities-based public programs</u>. Vision Grants: seed funding for project development, \$500 to \$1,500. Action Grants for project implementation, \$1,500-\$5,000, with 1:1 institutional match.

Vision Grants rolling deadline: two months before your first meeting Action Grants deadlines: October 1, 2019 for programs starting after January 1, 2020

Institute for Advanced Study

<u>School of Historical Studies</u>: Visiting memberships in Princeton, NJ, of a semester or a year for historical research, principally in Greek and Roman civilization, medieval, early modern and modern Europe, the Islamic world, East Asian studies, art history, the history of science, and late modern history with a special emphasis on the history of international relations. Stipend of up to \$78,000 for the 2020-21 academic year or \$39,000 for one semester.

Deadline: December 2019 TBA

<u>School of Social Science</u>: Visiting memberships in Princeton, NJ, for the 2020-21 academic year. Applications are encouraged from scholars across the social sciences. The theme for 2020-2021 is "Science and the State". Maximum stipend \$75,000. **Deadline:** November 1, 2019

Japan Foundation New York

<u>Japanese Studies Fellowships</u> in the humanities and social sciences to conduct research in Japan. Short-term (21-59 days) or long-term (2-12 months) fellowships cover airfare, travel insurance, monthly stipend, and other allowances. **Deadline**: November 1, 2019

<u>JFNY Grants for Arts and Culture</u>: Small grants for projects such as performances, exhibitions, film screenings, and workshops, up to \$5,000, that nurture further understanding of Japanese arts and culture.

Rolling deadline: apply at least 3 months prior to project start date.

Loeb Classical Library Foundation

<u>Fellowships</u> to support research, publication, and other projects in the area of classical studies. \$1,000-\$35,000 to support publication of research, enhancement of sabbaticals, travel to libraries or collections, dramatic productions, excavation expenses, or cost of research materials. **Deadline:** November 1, 2019

National Endowment for the Humanities

<u>Humanities Connections planning grants</u> for 12 months, up to \$35,000, and <u>implementation grants</u> for 18-36 months, up to \$100,000, support innovative curricular projects with long-term institutional support that foster partnerships among humanities faculty and their counterparts in the social and natural sciences. Proposed projects should incorporate experiential learning with the goal of designing a new, coherent curricular program or initiative, with collaboration between faculty from two or more separate departments or schools at one or more institutions (a minimum of one in and one outside of the humanities).

Deadline: September 19, 2019 for projects beginning no later than September 2020 **Deadline for optional draft proposals:** August 19, 2019

<u>Collaborative Research Grants</u> for interpretive humanities research undertaken by two or more collaborating scholars, full- or part-time for 1-3 years resulting in tangible and sustainable outcomes such as co-authored or multi-authored books, born-digital publications, themed issues of peer-reviewed journals, and content-rich, open-access digital resources (for example, websites, databases, or tools). Convening Grants for conferences and working group meetings (up to \$50,000) and Publication Grants (up to \$250,000). Institutional cost sharing is encouraged.

Deadline: December 4, 2019 for projects beginning October 2020 **Deadline for optional draft proposals**: October 15, 2019

<u>Scholarly Editions and Translations Grants</u> for preparation of editions and translations of pre-existing texts of value to the humanities that are currently inaccessible or available only in inadequate editions or transcriptions. Support for full- or part-time activities by teams of two or more, for 1-3 years, up to \$100,000 per year. Institutional cost sharing is encouraged.

Deadline: December 4, 2019 for projects beginning October 2020 **Deadline for optional draft proposals:** October 15, 2019

National Geographic Society

<u>Grants</u> for conservation, education, research, storytelling, and technology in the areas of Wildlife, Human Journey, and Changing Planet. Early Career grants (up to \$10,000), Exploration grants, up to \$30,000, and Requests for Proposals concentrating on human origins, species discovery and conservation, biodiversity, and other key issues. **Deadline**: October 9, 2019

National Humanities Center

<u>Residential Fellowships</u> for advanced study in the humanities during the 2020-2021 academic year at Research Triangle Park, NC. Includes half salary up to \$65,000 and travel expenses.

Deadline: October 10, 2019

National Institutes of Health

<u>Academic Research Enhancement Awards (AREA)</u> for small research projects in the biomedical and behavioral sciences that include the involvement of students. Up to \$300,000, plus indirect costs, for a period of up to 3 years.

Deadlines: October 25, February 25, and June 25, annually

National Science Foundation

For <u>funding in the sciences and social sciences</u> see solicitations under NSF disciplinary program areas, as well as NSF-wide opportunities.

<u>Facilitating Research at Primarily Undergraduate Institutions (RUI)</u> is an NSF-wide program that focuses support on undergraduate institutions. Proposals designated RUI support individual or collaborative research projects, especially those involving undergraduates.

Deadlines vary: Apply through the relevant <u>NSF Research Areas.</u>

Russell Sage Foundation

<u>Research grants</u> include Trustee Grants up to \$175,000 and Presidential Grants up to \$35,000 in the following program areas: Social, Political and Economic Inequality; Race, Ethnicity and Immigration; Behavioral Economics; Immigration & Immigrant Integration; and Decision Making and Human Behavior in Context.

Deadline for letters of inquiry: November 26, 2019. Applications for small grants in Behavioral Economics are accepted on a rolling basis.

Spencer Foundation

<u>Small Research Grants on Education</u> in the fields of education, anthropology, philosophy, psychology, sociology, economics, history, or neuroscience. Budgets of \$50,000 or less for projects ranging from 1-5 years. **Deadlines:** November 1, March 1, July 1 annually

Society for the Humanities at Cornell University

<u>Residential fellowships</u> for scholars and artists across humanistic disciplines who are interested in participating in critical dialogue concerning the <u>2020-21 theme of</u> <u>fabrication</u>. Society Fellows are appointed for one academic year and will receive \$52,000.

Deadline: October 1, 2019

Wenner-Gren Foundation

<u>Post-Ph.D. Research Grants</u> to support research projects in anthropology, particularly those that employ a comparative perspective, can generate innovative approaches or ideas, and/or integrate two or more subfields. Up to \$20,000 for any duration. **Deadline:** November 1, 2019

Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars

<u>Nine-month residential fellowships</u> in Washington, DC, for research and collaboration on national and/or international issues addressing key public policy challenges. Priority to proposals in topic areas of Geo-Strategic Competition: the U.S.-China-Russia Triangle;

Playing the Great Game: the Digital Edition; The Future of the New "Global Arctic"; and Rule of Law. Stipend up to \$90,000. **Deadline**: October 1, 2019
